Warships sent to combat bushfires of 200 homes already destroyed

USHFIRES are still raging in many areas around Australia (澳洲), and have destroyed more than 200 houses in the **coastal** region. At least 43 houses have been burnt down in East Gippsland, Victoria; and about 200 houses are destroyed in New South Wales (NSW). At least three people have died, and the Australian **navy** has sent out warships and helicopters to the affected areas.

Because Australia is currently suffering from a **heat-wave** of over 40 degrees Celsius, a bad **drought** and strong winds, the bushfires in eastern Australia have been especially intense. Although NSW is suffering the most, Victoria is also hurting because it faces both fires from NSW and those starting from within. The two warships that have been sent are the HMAS *Choules* and MV *Sycamore*, but they took 72 and 48 hours to arrive respectively.

Zoo fire kills at least 30 animals

N western Germany (德國), a zoo caught fire and over 30 animals died as a result. Early on New Year's Day, a fire started in the **primate** area of the Krefeld zoo, which borders the Netherlands (荷蘭). On top of the apes and monkeys, bats and birds living in the building were also killed.

One of the firefighters, Andreas Klos, said, "We were amazed that the building burned down so quickly." He added that

there was no **sprinkler** system at the ape house and the apes actually died from breathing in too much smoke and were not burnt.

A witness said that they saw a sky lantern land where the fire started. Three women have been questioned by the police, and the trio were said to be "extremely sorry". They supposedly bought the lanterns online, not knowing that they are banned in Germany.

A 'helicopter' is an aircraft that flies using rotors on top.
