Museum shows first ever Christmas cards Haliday, pieces made back in 1843



Only 21 of the 1,000 original cards survive.



HE first printed Christmas card in the world is currently **on display** at the Charles Dickens Museum, located in London. Printed in 1843, it was commissioned by Henry Cole, the first **curator** of another London museum, the Victoria and Albert Museum.

Cole asked an artist, John Callcott Horsley, to create 1,000 holiday cards, on which a drawing and the words "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You" are present. The drawing is of a wealthy family around a table, with three **generations** raising their drinks to wish one another a happy holiday.

The design was **carved** onto a stone tablet, pressed onto cardboard with black-brown ink and coloured in after the printing. They were sold at a shilling each. Of the 1,000 printed cards, only 21 remain, one of which is on loan to the museum from a book dealer in San Francisco (三藩市), until 19 April, 2020.

Abe becomes Japan's longest-serving prime minister

S of late November, Shinzo Abe has been **in office** as Japan's (日本) longest-serving prime minister. But his **administration** is currently facing many challenges, such as Japan's economic problems.

The **previous** longest-serving
Japanese prime minister was Taro
Katsura, who served from 1901 to 1913.
Abe, age 65, is also the second-longest serving leader of a G7 country, with

Germany's (德國) Angela Merkel being in power the longest amongst the G7 leaders.

Abe actually first became prime minister back in 2006, but was **voted** out just one year later. He got back into office in 2012. Abe said he has learnt his lesson from his one-year term well, and has worked hard for the Japanese people ever since.

But after Japan lost in World War II, the US took over and made the prime minister, who has to be elected, the actual ruler of the country, with the emperor being only a symbol.
